The rules for riding the bus were not simple during the 1950s in the southern part of America. White people got on the bus from the front door. Black people also got on from the front door, only to pay the money. But they had to get off and go to the back door to get on the bus again. The front *rows were for white people and the back rows were for black people. The middle rows were for both. However, black people could not sit in the same row with white people.

It was Montgomery, in Alabama, U.S.A.

On December 1, 1955, Rosa Parks left work and caught the bus. She sat down in one of the seats for blacks. Soon the bus became full of people. There were no more seats in the section for white people, and one white man had to stand. The driver shouted to Rosa and the other black people sitting in the back row. "Hey! Stand up! You must move!" The black people in Rosa's row got up, but Rosa did not. She thought, "This isn't fair. Something should be done to stop it." The driver said, "If you don't move, I'll call the police." "You may do that," Rosa answered quietly.

The police car came soon and the policemen put her in *jail. Luckily, Edgar Nixon, her best friend, was able to pay one hundred dollars and Rosa could get out of jail. Nixon asked her to think about a *lawsuit against the city bus company. By Rosa's lawsuit, *judges might say that the seating rules in public buses were against the law. He said, "①If the judges do that, people, black or white, [in / like / sit / can / seat / they / any]." Rosa thought about Nixon's idea deeply, and said, "Yes."

Fred Gray was one of two black lawyers in Montgomery. He agreed to work for Rosa for no money. He wanted all the black people in Montgomery to *boycott riding the public buses to support her. Many handouts for the boycott were given to black people on the street.

On the first day of the boycott, Rosa was worried. However, several empty buses went by her house. Soon the streets were filled with black people walking to schools or to jobs. They were happy to ②do their part, and the bus companies realized how much their business needed black people. The boycott was a great success.

On the same day, Rosa's *trial began. The bus driver did not tell a true story. He said that there were many empty seats in the back, but Rosa stayed in the middle rows. Rosa did not have any *witnesses for herself. In fact, her lawyer wanted her to be *guilty in this trial. It was because he thought they could go to a *higher court if they lost, and only a higher court had the power to end the bus rules.

When Rosa received a guilty *verdict, Rosa and Rosa's lawyer *challenged the verdict and tried to go to the higher court. Finally, on November 13, 1956, the United States Supreme Court, the highest court in the country, said that ③bus segregation was against the law. Rosa

cried with happiness.

In December 1956, Rosa got on the bus. This time she sat in one of the front seats with a peaceful smile on her face.

 - イ On a bus, black people could sit in the back and middle rows but they had to get off the bus when it was full.
 - ウ Rosa did not get up from her seat when the bus driver told her to do so, because she knew nothing about the seating rules in the public bus.
 - エ When Rosa and other black people did not get up from their seats, the bus driver called the police right away.
 - オ As Fred Gray thought it was difficult for Rosa to get the support from the black community, he was against the bus boycott.
 - カ Rosa's lawyer did not care about losing their first trial because he wanted to win the trial at a higher court.
 - キ Although Rosa received a guilty verdict, she was not disappointed and started a new challenge against the police.
